On July 28, 2018, the La Plata Police Department (LPPD) became the smallest law enforcement agency in Maryland to earn accreditation through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). A report prepared by the assessment team, who spent several days onsite at LPPD noted, after interviewing residents, business owners, special interest group leaders, elected officials, and LPPD staff, “Crime prevention and community involvement is clearly a strength for the La Plata Police Department. The agency is visible, proactive and community oriented and has successfully engaged its community in a partnership to maintain a safe community.” Community involvement is a priority for the agency.

La Plata Police host 5th annual block party

25 local business partners participate in day of festivities

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For the fifth year in a row, the La Plata Police Department invited families to join them for a party in Caroline Park near Kent Avenue that featured hot dogs, face painting, a bean-bag toss, the traditional giant water slide and an inflatable obstacle course.

There was plenty for adults as well, including health screenings and medical referrals, voter registration, information on food pantries and addiction services in the community, and opportunities to meet and chat

LPPD's largest community policing event occurs in the Kent Avenue Corridor. An area where some residents are financially disadvantaged. At the annual event, LPPD brings in a plethora of partners to include:

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While LPPD officers interact with members of the community. LPPD's community partners conduct health screenings, provide information on eldercare and childcare, give away backpacks containing school supplies, food staple items, and several tons of fresh produce.

"It's more than just a party," Charles County State's Attorney Tony Covington told the Maryland Independent. "It's a good way to provide services to a community that could use a little bit extra help now and then, although there are probably times that every community could use help like this, too."



LPPD holds two block parties a year, the annual block party in the Kent Avenue Corridor every August just prior to school beginning. The second block party is held a different community each year.

Home/Small Business Video Mini-Grants



In partnership with the La Plata Council, LPPD offers home video mini-grants to residents and small businesses in an effort to help reduce crime. Since the grants inception, approximately 80 residents and small businesses have received awards. The one caveat to the grant program is the recipient must share any images captured with the LPPD for official investigations. Images captured by grant awardees have been instrumental in solving numerous crimes.

Stuff the Squad Car

No Child Should Go Hungry in La Plata or Charles County. In an effort to support LifeStyles of Maryland's Summer Meals Plus Program, LPPD teams up with Safeway Food Stores to collect needed food items to ensure local young people have sufficient food during school's summer break. Items collected include:

- Tuna Snack Kits
- Chef Boyardee Variety Pack 7.5 ounce Microwaveable Meals
- Fruit Cups (Mixed Fruit, Peaches, Pears, Oranges) and Apple Sauce
- Juice Box or Pouch (Capri Sun, Kool-Aid Jammers) and 16.9 Ounce Bottles of Water
- Cookies (Any Variety)
- Potato Chips (Plain) and Crackers



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Operation Prevent Porch Piracy



Over the last several years La Plata residents experienced an increase in parcel thefts, especially during the holiday season. In an effort to prevent package thefts during the holiday season, LPPD allows residents to have parcel packages delivered to the station. Residents can then make an appointment to pick up the parcels. Since the inception of Operation Prevent Porch Piracy, reports of package thefts have decreased dramatically in La Plata.

Safe Transactions

To ensure the safety of both buyers and sellers, LPPD was one of the first agencies in Maryland to offer a Safe Transactions Program. La Plata citizens and business owners can arrange to meet individuals in the station parking lot or lobby to ensure a safe transaction. LPPD officers will also check a VIN or serial number to ensure the item being purchased is not stolen.

Counterfeit Currency Initiative



La Plata businesses from time-to-time experience losses due to counterfeit currency. Annually, LPPD officers visit local businesses and remind them how to spot counterfeit currency, provide employees with an educational poster, and equip local businesses with a detection pen(s).

Moreover, LPPD commanders routinely attend La Plata Business Association meetings to discuss regional crime trends and ways a business can make itself a harder target.

Home Security Surveys

Officers certified in Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design or CPTED (pronounced sep-ted), provide residents with a free home security survey. CPTED is a crime prevention philosophy based on the theory that proper design and effective use of the building environment can lead to a reduction in the fear and incidence of crime, as well as an improvement in the quality of life



Business Security Surveys



The La Plata Police Department offers the business community the service of a trained crime prevention specialist who will come to their business and perform a security survey. The officer will provide pointers on proper lighting, locks, and landscaping. The officer can also speak to employees about robbery prevention and how to respond in the event of a robbery along with other applicable topics.

Coffee with a Cop

The Chief along with members of Command Staff hold several Coffee with a Cop events annually. LPPD has found “Coffee with Cop” is a unique way to strengthen the partnership between the police department and the residents and business owners it serves. An open dialogue breaks down barriers in establishing a true partnership between police department and the community.



Public Information Campaigns



LPPD works diligently to raise awareness on public welfare and safety topics, especially those that effect La Plata’s most vulnerable citizens - children and the elderly. Every April, LPPD actively raises awareness through social media about child abuse. LPPD also actively participates in domestic violence education, elder abuse, and pet safety during extreme weather conditions.

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Backpacks of Love for Foster Children

LPPD is clearinghouse in Charles County for the Blue-Ribbon Project - Backpacks of Love for Foster Children program. LPPD, or another law enforcement agency in Charles County will deliver an age appropriate backpack containing clothing, hygiene items, school supplies, and an age suitable toy or game within the first critical hours of placement. This program is designed to assist not only the child, but the foster parents as well.

LPPD offers its residents and small business owners vacation checks. While a home or business owner is away an officer will check their residence or small business daily. If the officer notices anything unusual or out of place, they will alert the home or business owner.

National Night Out

National Night Out (NNO) is an annual community-building campaign that promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie to make our neighborhoods safer and more caring places to live. NNO enhances the relationship between neighbors and law enforcement while bringing back a true sense of community. Furthermore, it provides a great opportunity to bring police and neighbors together under positive circumstances.

Annually, over a dozen La Plata communities and churches participate in NNO.



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Explorer Post 1888



Law Enforcement Exploring is a hands-on program open to young men and women who have completed the 6th grade through 20 years old, interested in a career in law enforcement or a related field in the criminal justice system.

The program offers young adults a personal awareness of the criminal justice system through training, practical experiences, competition and other activities. Additionally, the program promotes personal growth through character development, respect for the rule of law, physical fitness, good citizenship and patriotism.

The La Plata Explorer Post #1888, meets twice a month. Explorers routinely participate in community events to include 5Ks, parades, and concerts.

Special Olympics

Special Olympics strives to create a better world by fostering the acceptance and inclusion of all people.

Through the power of sports, people with intellectual disabilities discover new strengths and abilities, skills and success. Our athletes find joy, confidence and fulfillment -- on the playing field and in life. They also inspire people in their communities and elsewhere to open their hearts to a wider world of human talents and potential.

Toys for Tots



The goal of Toys for Tots is, through the gift of a new toy, help bring the joy of Christmas and send a message of hope to America's less fortunate children.

Annually, the La Plata residents, business owners, and town staff generously donate to the Toys for Tots Campaign. LPPD serves as a collection point for the Toys for Tots Campaign, with officers delivering the new unwrapped gifts to a regional collection point for distribution.

Shop with a Cop

Shop with a Cop is a program to assist economically less fortunate youth during the Holiday Season.

Annually, LPPD participates in the Charles County Sheriff's Office Shop with a Cop event. Local youth are escorted to the Waldorf Wal-Mart to purchase items for themselves and their families. The youth then travel back with their law enforcement partner to the Moose Lodge where everyone enjoys lunch while local volunteers wrap the youth's presents.



A Night at Camden Yards



In partnership with the Baltimore Orioles, Milton Somers Middle School, Charles County Chapter of the NAACP, Swann Transportation and Island Music, LPPD hosted a Night at Camden Yards for youth who might never have the opportunity to watch a Major League Baseball in America's top rated venue. Each year approximately 50 youth, chaperones and officers make the trip to Camden Yards.

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
Drive Like Your Kids Live Here



Annually, LPPD distributes approximately four dozen “Drive Like Your Kids Live Here” signs to be placed in neighborhoods to remind motorists to slow down. This initiative is coupled with a proactive pedestrian safety social media campaign.

Child Safety Seat Inspections/Installations

LPPD has several officers who are certified to inspect and install child safety seats. Safety seat inspections and installations are conducted by appointment.



Dedicated Impaired Driving Checkpoints



Annually, LPPD hosts a multi-jurisdictional impaired driving checkpoint dedicated to the memory of individuals killed by an impaired driver. Most recently, LPPD dedicated a checkpoint to Autumn Jenkins, a young volunteer firefighter, and Ethan Ruefley, a two-month-old baby, both of whom were killed in Charles County by impaired drivers in separate collisions.

Ride-Along Program



The La Plata Police Department Ride Along Program is designed to help educate the community about what the police department does daily, and to help residents become familiar with the officers and the department. The program is intended to develop partnerships with the community through interaction. The Ride-Along Program is designed to foster a better understanding of the challenges, hazards and rewards of being a police officer in the La Plata community.

Active Shooter Training

Active shooter incidents are often unpredictable and evolve quickly. In the midst of the chaos, anyone can play an integral role in mitigating the impacts of an active shooter incident.

Trained LPPD officers instruct local private school administrators and other organization on response to an active shooter incident. LPPD's instructors training was provided by the United States Department of Justice and Texas State University.



Crime Watch Council



The Crime Watch Council meets monthly to discuss quality-of-life and crime issues in La Plata. The Council is made up of representatives from various communities within La Plata. Members of the Crime Watch Council have also participate on hiring and promotional boards, as well as assisting the agency in evaluating and awarding mini-grants.

Adhering to the Ten Guiding Principles Identified by the United States Department of Justice – Office of Community Policing

1. Crime Prevention is the responsibility of the total community.
2. The police and community share ownership, responsibility, and accountability for the prevention of crime.
3. Police effectiveness is a function of crime control, crime prevention, problem solving, and community satisfaction, quality of life, and community engagement.
4. Mutual trust between the police and the community is essential for effective policing.
5. Crime prevention must be a flexible, long-term strategy in which the police and community collectively commit to resolving complex and chronic cause of crime.
6. Community policing requires the knowledge, access, and mobilization of community resources.
7. Community policing can only succeed when top management, police and government officials enthusiastically support its principle and tenants.
8. Community policing depends on decentralization, community-based participation in decision making.
9. Community policing allocates resources and services based on analysis, identification, and projection of patterns and trends, rather than incidents.
10. Community policing requires an investment in training with special attention to problem analysis and problem solving, facilitation, community organization, communication, mediation and conflict resolution, resource identification and use, networking and linkages, and cross-cultural competency.
